
The trustees are enthusiastically supporting Jo in her new role within the garden and have promised that they will attempt to share the "burden" as much as they can! *Martyn Hurst*

Volunteers News

June 2012

I'm looking at the entry for 16th June 2002 in "The Ivington Diaries" by Monty Don and it says: "It has rained for twelve days now. Occasionally it stops, regroups, tries to soften you with a blast of hot sunshine, waits until bits of clothing are scattered irretrievably around the garden, before hitting you with another sudden downpour... This is not *bad* weather – just wetter than normal..." Hm! It certainly sums up June 2012.

However! Amidst the rain and wind the garden is looking stunning. The old shrub roses are at their best, the Damask roses and the Gallica roses – goodness, which are the most beautiful? And the pergola looks great with the beautiful *Rosa avensis* 'Janet B. Wood' twisting up the supports. It was well worth the struggle Tina and Val B. earlier in the year to tie them round!



New to the garden is the display stand by the office, displaying Sue's early pre-1800 pelargoniums, most of which I think she has raised from cuttings..

Another huge thank you to Rebecca and Jo for organising the Volunteers' trip this year and particularly to Jo for driving the minibus in and around the roads of Herefordshire to the Black Mountains.

Val C. tells me she is making Elderflower Champagne (allegedly non-alcoholic!) from the flowers of the Elder in the Dye Bed – I last saw her wielding some extremely long secateurs.

July 2012

Well, yesterday July 19th, we volunteers actually had lunch outside in our shirt sleeves following the monsoon rain period! Despite the atrocious weather, the garden is looking stunning with the giants of the plant beds coming into their own. The *Elecampane* and Lovage towering just above the lovely tall Hollyhocks. At their best at the moment are the Purple Loosestrife, Mallow, Chicory – with its gorgeous blue flowers, the yellow *Verbascum*

spires, the Dyers Greenwood covered in tiny yellow flowers and the mauve/blue Goat's rue (*Galega officinalis*). My eye was also caught by the spires of the less showy, but interesting, *Acanthus spinosa* – Spiny Bears Breeches. The bees are buzzing round the Vipers Bugloss – *Echium officinalis*, the Wild Carrot flowers and, of course, the Borage.

We're delighted to see the little robin fledgling boldly following us around the garden and one of the volunteers thought some young sparrows had been raised in the bird box on the toolshed end of the Pergola

We've been working hard on the box hedging. The older ones are surviving with a few losses and this year we have pruned them individually with secateurs, carefully catching and removing any dead leaves which may be diseased

On the lighter side we have been sharing Val C's delicious elderflower champagne made from the garden's elderflowers!

August 2012

As I look back on August in the Physic Garden I am still reeling from the spectacular meadow planting at the Olympic Park in London which I was fortunate enough to visit. Then I look at the Physic Garden and our lovely wild flowers – I think we have most of their lovely wild flowers – many covered in bees at this time of the year – catching my eye as star-bee attractors are the Asters, the *Echinacea* (Coneflower – spectacular at the moment and pausing visitors to stop and ask what the plant is), the Borage, Marsh Mallow, and of course Purple Loosestrife.



We've completed the summer pruning of the *Malus*, (Apples trees) and Pear trees, the vines have good bunches of grapes growing, whereas the apple crop will be poor (as in many gardens as a result of our sodden summer).

Well, it's the end of August and, "At this stage of the year dusk creeps forward week by week. Strange to think that only two months ago was the longest day, light by four in the morning and still light enough to water the garden at ten in the evening. In June the sun sinks down by a notch just by the church tower that sits to our north. Now almost daily, it is edging back westwards across the sky..." (Monty Don – the Ivington Diaries). Sorry, bit of lyrical rambling!!

September 2012

'The Michaelmas daisy season reaches its peak in the middle of this month and there are many delights to tempt us. Many, also, that we should be wiser to resist, although, having said that, I have a sneaking feeling that it is no bad thing to yield, savouring the moment uninhibited'.

Christopher Lloyd (Cuttings, A Year in the Garden with Christopher Lloyd) is referring to October here, but judging by the comments of visitors to the Physic Garden, the Asters have the visitors' vote now at the end of September.

Other plants in their prime in the garden include the lovely seedheads of many of the taller architectural plants such as the Fennel, the tall *Elecampane*, *Mullein*, *Acanthus spinosa* and *Cardoon*. We were delighted to see a goldfinch on the *Elecampane*. Some of the volunteers have also seen a little harvest mouse and we continue to delight in the antics of our robin.

We have also been looking to the future and Gardening Group has discussed some possible new shrubs and herbaceous plants for the garden in particular for the outer beds. Details of plants we do acquire I will list as we get them. The old variety Tulips will arrive shortly as indeed will Narcissus varieties which will be planted soon.

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Introducing the Volunteers

Gillian Griffiths



Throughout a career of 23 years as a secretary with the South Wales Police, Gillian pursued her passion for painting flowers and attended non-vocational courses in Botanical Illustration at West Dean College, Chichester.

In 1986 she was awarded a Gold Medal at the Royal Horticultural Society's exhibition in London for a series of paintings of Ornamental Flowering Crab Apples. She was subsequently awarded two silver-gilt medals and in 2002 a further Gold Medal for paintings of Alpine Primulas and Auriculas.

After an inaugural one-woman exhibition in 1988 at the Heritage Centre, Southerndown, she resigned from her job and became a full-time professional artist and teacher. She specializes in flowers and wildlife, still life, seascapes and river scenes, but her passion is still for botanical paintings. After retiring from full-time painting in 2007, she is now recording the flowers and shrubs of the Cowbridge Physic Garden for pleasure.

She has a painting in the acclaimed Shirley Sherwood Collection which was initially exhibited at Kew Gardens before embarking on a world wide tour. Her collection of paintings of Carnivorous Plants was purchased by Cardiff Museum.

She has taught and exhibited at the National Botanic Garden of Wales, St. Fagans Rural Life Museum, Cardiff Museum, Glynn Vivian Gallery Swansea, Aberglasney, and annually at the Heritage Centre, Southerndown.

She has been an active volunteer at Cowbridge Physic Garden since it started in 2006.

Gillian has an exceptional talent which she possesses artistically but she has contributed so much to the Cowbridge Physic Garden since it was created as a regular volunteer on the gardening front, but also in helping all the rest of us volunteers to stay organised on the practical office matters, galvanising us into action with humour and energy.

Her generosity of spirit is extended into a small botanical art class which some of us are lucky enough to belong to – despite our obvious limitations she determinedly fills us with hope! The pleasure she gives so many of us is immeasurable.

The Garden wins prestigious Green Flag Award for fourth year running.

At a ceremony at the Royal Welsh Show at Builth Wells, Jo Homfray, Chair of the Cowbridge Physic Garden received the Keep Britain Tidy Green Flag Award. This is the fourth year in a row that the Garden has been recognized for its quality, high standard of maintenance and management, and overall beauty as an asset to Cowbridge.

The Green Flag scheme this year has recognized over 1,000 parks and green spaces throughout Great Britain – though a great many more apply but fail to reach the required standard. The fact that Cowbridge Physic Garden has now received the accolade for the fourth successive year is a fitting tribute to the hard work, dedication and gardening skills of the team of volunteers who plan, plant and maintain the garden in such an impressive way.

Jo Homfray, on receiving the award commented, “I’m thrilled that yet again the Physic Garden has been recognized and rewarded with its fourth Green Flag. We wouldn’t dare assume we would automatically win it. We know how high the judging standards are. So it’s especially gratifying that our volunteers’ hard work in making the Physic Garden such a wonderful herbal and horticultural gem is recognized in this way. Well done to all!”

The organisers of the Green Flag Award scheme, Keep Britain Tidy, also commented on the achievements of all the winners, and especially wished to thank the more than 800 volunteer judges who assessed the record-breaking number of applicants this year.


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2012 Christmas Card
